

A CELEBRATION OF BLACK HISTORY AT WHHS

The Social Studies department is celebrating Black History through various activities including a month-long history quiz and a Black Mount Rushmore project students will work on in some of their History and other classes. The project will feature four prominent African-Americans who had an overwhelming impact on society through 1976, with an emphasis on little-known historians. In Mr. Washington's class,

scholars will create an obituary for a pre-Civil Rights activists and how they inspired future activists. The activity falls within the Civic Participation and Citizenship standard. Other staff and students throughout the building are competing in a door-decorating contest displaying the "First Greats" in African-American history. For instance, Barack Obama is the first African-American president.



BLACK HISTORY FACT:

Black History Month began as "Negro History Week," which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a noted African-American historian, scholar, educator, and publisher. It became a month-long celebration in 1976.

HCOM Campus Visit

The WHHS 12th grade students had a busy day for their recent Day 3 of the Aspiring Doctors Precollege Program! Students kicked off the morning by stepping into the shoes of a physician and learning how to take a patient history and the value of open communication. Nurse educator, Pat Lambert, along with a few medical students taught the students techniques for interviewing and then put their skills to the test in the exam rooms. The high school students played the role of doctor and interviewed the medical students who took on the role of patient. That activity was followed by a lesson on the injustice of illness delivered by social medicine faculty, Dr. Sarah Rubin. Students learned about the social determinants of health and why health disparities exist among minority populations.

Practical 3D Printing

3D printed electronics manufacturer Nano Dimension recently completed tests on "smart" functional fabrics that could be worn, folded and stretched without damaging or compromising the integrated electronics. That means one day your T-shirt could hold your MP3 player. In the meantime, in the WHHS Graphic Arts room, scholars are working on their modern version of 3D printing.
